

# Transition "Basics"



# Elements in IEP Transition Planning



## Transition

- A transition plan must be in place by the student's 16<sup>th</sup> birthday.
  - Most professionals start the planning by the 14<sup>th</sup> birthday.
- Parents, Teachers, Specialist and the student should work together to produce an appropriate plan.
  - Formal and informal test should be conducted to find the students aptitudes and possible future careers.
- Transition plans are required under IDEA2004
- Students should be taught about their rights under Section 504 and ADA.
  - Pictures/visuals may be needed to help students understand their rights more fully.
- Special education students may remain in school until the age of 21 in order to meet their post-secondary goals.

## Assessing for Transition plans

#### Transition assessments can be either formal or informal.

#### • Formal assessment:

- Standard process or procedure
- Generally results in a score that is interpreted by a professional in relation to a specific student
- Results should include an explanation of potential implications for the student's future plans

#### Informal assessment:

- Less structured
- Often descriptive in nature
- Best if used over time to compare and identify change or progress
- Can be collected from a variety of individuals, including parents, paraprofessionals, and others who know the student well



- A Teaching framework used to teach kids social skills
- Helps kids figure out what others are thinking
- Leads to better social skills

## Effectiveness of Social Stories from Kokina and Kern's 2010 Meta-Analysis



Are Social stories Effective? Maybe...

Kokina and Kern conducted a Meta-Analysis and the results are that Social Stories are worth trying. 51% is not an overwhelming majority but it does indicate that social stories can help students with Autism. (Note this Meta-Analysis focused only on ASD interventions no other disabilities)
